#### PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Kia Ora whānau o te kura,

I am still feeling elated from two great experiences over a week. One was the brilliant community day we had last Friday with Pets Day. Thank you so much for contributing to the day with supporting your tamariki to be part of such a great school tradition. Andrea Mathews and her tireless team of parent volunteers deserve medals for the work, as do all school staff and our amazing kids on the day - thank you! The second was our Kapa Haka Roopu - Toitoiwhakamanawa - who performed with such mana and power yesterday as part of the Puanga Festival in Waitara. Truly incredible! Aaliyah Reade has been coordinating our roopu and we are so grateful for her help working alongside our fantastic tutors Lewis, Lukey and Kaarena.

I wanted to briefly bring back into frame for everyone the significant change we have at Mangorei in 2026 - and no, I'm not going to talk curriculum which I know is dominating any education media attention at the moment! I have previously discussed the Special Learning Unit we will have, which will be in Kōkako, run by Te Arahanga Special School. Te Arahanga are based in Whanganui and have satellite classes across multiple schools in the Manawātu, Whanganui and in three schools in the Taranaki region, with Mangorei becoming the 4th. The key purpose for the Board's decision to have this relationship with Te Arahanga, has been to ensure tamariki with high health and physical needs can attend a school with a specialist teacher and specialist support staff to meet these needs with education at the heart.

A key role of all schools is to provide a safe and inclusive environment for all tamariki, and part of this is providing safety for students who cognitively have difficulty with understanding boundaries. Most of our ākonga are great at knowing where it is safe, and where we have out-of-bounds areas. I had previously mentioned that the school will therefore be getting a new fence installed over the summer (hopefully mostly in the holidays) which will run from the turf, all the way around the front of the school (where fencing is inadequate), through the junior bush area to the caretakers shed. This in turn will make the site safer for all tamariki.

With new fences and gates, it means there will be a process to ensure that entering and exiting the school grounds still maintains the safety of all. This process is still in formation and in the centre of this we are wanting to have as minimal impact on the current process that all our families enjoy. Keep an eye out for this before the start of 2026.

I want to mention briefly how proud the Mangorei Staff are of our ex-Mangorei Girls at New Plymouth Girls High School who are in leadership positions next year as Year 13s. Melody Gordon will be deputy head girl for 2026, Sarah Duncan and Indie Ruka are both leaders of houses with Daisy Paterson as a deputy leader. Grace King is the Performing Arts leader for dance and Hannah Willeman is the co-leader for Hauora - ka rawe!



This year the enviro team has been looking at some options to reduce our waste on special days. On Pets Day, we had three bins and a compost bucket set out to collect waste. #### UNITED TRIBES FLAG - HE WHAKAPUTANGA

If you ask most Kiwis when Independence Day is chances are they'll say "July 4". Not too many people know that New Zealand has its own Independence Day and that day was on Tuesday – October 28! On 28 October 1835, at the home of James Busby in Waitangi, 34 northern chiefs signed He Whakaputanga o te Rangatiratanga o Nu Tireni (known in English as the Declaration of Independence of the United Tribes of New Zealand).

Busby was trying to solve the problem that ships made in NZ had to fly under a flag or be seized and he saw it as a chance to unite the Māori tribes at the time.

This was the first time the collective of tribes had come together previously tribes as operated more independently from each other. To Māori the declaration Independence meant that the Crown acknowledging NZ as an independent nation and the mana of the chiefs. The flag's authority was recognised by the Crown as a legal NZ Flag which still remains in that status todav.




